#### Some Like it Hot - 2016 SMDA Show Season!

Show season is in full swing. We've had two schooling shows in May and August, and our USDF/USEF Recognized Show in July. There have also been a number of SMDA-affiliated shows this year.

#### **USDF/USEF Recognized Show**

Our Recognized Show was a big success, drawing riders from all parts of the state and some from New Hampshire. We had a full range of rides from Training Level through FEI. The show schedule included several Prix St. Georges rides, and it was a treat to watch Laura Noyes and Galveston compete at Grand Prix – something we don't see at the Hollis Equestrian Park very often!

Our judge, Charlotte Trentelman, came up from Florida, and we were lucky to get the same Technical Delegate (TD) as last year, Gail Majuckas. The TD's role if very important, as she ensures USDF/USEF rules are understood and followed, and keeps an eye on the horses with regards to their safety and concern for their treatment.

This was our second Recognized Show, and things were definitely easier this year. The SMDA Board of Directors has recently voted to include a USDF/USEF Recognized Show in our schedule again next year. The date must be approved by USEF, but we are targeting the same weekend in mid-July. We hope that a schedule of three Schooling Shows and one USDF/USEF Recognized Show is the right mix for our membership and the Maine dressage community.

We owe a special Thank You to our show Manager Robyn Cuffey, and Show Secretaries Elena Raymond and Polly Shields. Without their hard work and dedication, this special event could not have occurred. A round of applause, please!

#### Member Profile - Meet Elizabeth Sanborn!

Elizabeth Sanborn doesn't remember a time when she didn't have horses in her life. She has been an SMDA member for more than a decade, first showing her Morgan mare Joydale Sparklerslas and then her three Standardbred mares: Dreamy Starlet, Revenue Stream, and Snap Dancer. She jokingly says, "I guess I have found a knack for bringing previously unridden Standardbred mares along in the lower levels!" Dreamy was fifteen when Elizabeth started her under saddle for the first time. Elizabeth brought her along through First level, even riding a test sidesaddle! They were undefeated at Prix Caprilli the year SMDA offered it. The pair also competed through Beginner Novice eventing and "A" rated hunter shows and were post parade marshals at three Maine racetracks. Elizabeth is very proud to have represented the Standardbred breed by participating in four breed demonstrations with Dreamy at World Equestrian Games at the Kentucky Horse Park in October 2010.



Her new mare Snap Dancer, known as Snappy, was a very successful trotter, most notably winning the prestigious 2007 Joseph Ricci Memorial Trot. Snappy helped Elizabeth earn her USTA Racing Under Saddle license, which is how they met! After putting her under saddle with only the intent to race her, over a year later when it was time for Snappy to retire from racing, her owner gave her to Elizabeth. This is her first year showing and so far has done quite well adjusting to her new career. To support her horsey habit, Elizabeth is the gifted and talented teacher in the Sacopee Valley School district. She lives on a farm in Hiram with her husband Jason, two sons Clarence (12 years old) and Jared (11 months old), Dreamy and Snappy, two oxen, and two cats.

#### **Schooling Shows**

Our two Schooling Shows to date have also been a success. The May show was full with a short wait list, and the August 21 show did not quite fill, which was a surprise. It just goes to show that even with the most careful planning, everything related to horses is unpredictable! Things went well, however, and our judge Laura Mitchell helped each rider with positive and encouraging feedback.


Our last schooling show of the year is September 18. During lunch we will have a vaulting demonstration by the Carlisle Academy

vaulting team. For those of us who need a three-step mounting block to get on our horses, this will be fun to watch!









Equestrian Vaulting is described as a combination of dance and gymnastics on the back of a moving horse. A vaulting horse is lunged on a 15-meter circle and the vaulters learn to mount and dismount while the horse continues moving. Vaulting horses must be proficient at lunging, have a level-headed demeanor, and be agreeable with one or more individuals moving about on their body from head to tail. A broad back

and comfortable, steady gaits are also desirable characteristics!

Vaulting competitions consist of Compulsories and Freestyle at the walk, trot, or canter. Compulsories are a set of positions, performed

individually, based on form, balance, and lift. Freestyle competition tests the vaulter's ability to create an artistic routine to music. Freestyles can be done individually or by a team. Vaulting practice always consists stretching, physical exercise, and work on the vaulting barrel first to develop skill and expertise prior to using the horse.



#### 2017 Show Season

We're busy making plans for 2017. We will have three schooling shows plus the USDF/USEF Recognized Show. The show dates are not confirmed, but we plan to keep the dates similar to this year (May, July, August, and September). Once we clear the dates with USEF and Hollis Equestrian Park, we will post them on Facebook and our website.




What does the Show Secretary do? The best part about the Show Secretary job is that all your work is done in advance and you can still ride in the show! SMDA uses Fox Village Dressage show software with the club laptop and printer. The Secretary is responsible for checking the entry forms, and entering the rider and horse information into the computer program in order to generate the show schedule. It's a fairly straightforward job, but you do need to be comfortable using a computer.

What does the Show Manager do? The Show Manager organizes things for show day. With help from SMDA, the Show Manager lines-up volunteers to staff the various jobs, makes arrangements for lunch, communicates with the judge, organizes ring set-up, and in general makes sure things go smoothly. The best part about being Show Manager is that you get to watch the rides, and visit with people at the show!

These are important jobs with a lot of responsibility – but SMDA works with you to provide support and answer questions, so even if you've never done this kind of job before please consider taking a turn and helping out!

But I've never been a Show Secretary or Manager! I couldn't possibly do that job!
